IMMERSE YOURSELF IN THE WORLD OF RABELAIS

Sharpen your senses!

This is an iconic place in the life and work of Rabelais. François Rabelais was born in 1483 or 1494 at La Devinière, a country home located in Seuilly, 7 kilometres from Chinon. When he wrote *Gargantua*, the writer made his **native home** and the surrounding landscape the epicentre of the Picrocholine wars. The author is one of the few writers to have a place named after him: Rabelaisie.

La Devinière is **the only museum dedicated to this major figure** who was a humanist, epicurean, and writer. The museum is a registered historic monument. This constantly evolving site is made up of a group of remarkable and significant buildings: a 15^{th} -century dwelling, a pigeon house, a cave habitat, vast cellars, a winegrower's house, and more. The grounds include a garden, an orchard, and vineyards.

The Rabelais Museum offers a panorama of experiences. Visitors can embark on adventures with the giants from Rabelais' works along a guided path and hiking trails.

In addition to rare editions, old engravings, and portraits (including one signed by Matisse), the museum offers a playful tour for children and "tasting tours" or "sweet and savoury readings" for adults.

An **emblematic place** in the preserved environment of the Loire-Anjou-Touraine regional natural park.

GENERAL INTRODUCTION

The adventures of Gargantua take place in the Loire region, which is listed as a World Heritage Site by UNESCO. The region encompasses the borders of Touraine, Poitou, and Saumur, and at the confluence of the Vienne and Loire rivers. The museum, which is located within this natural environment, at the heart of Chinon, retraces the highlights of Rabelais' life. The writer's childhood home is an ideal setting to present his rich and whimsical work, as well as to introduce visitors to new ideas emerging in the Renaissance.

A JOURNEY INTO THE IMAGINATION OF RABELAIS

François Rabelais' father, Antoine, was a lawyer at the royal seat of Chinon and seneschal of Lerné. He owned several properties, including this "country home" in Seuilly, which he inherited from his mother.

A tour of La Devinière can be self-guided or in the company of an on-site guide (at no extra charge). It takes visitors through the works of Rabelais, recalling characters that seem all too familiar: Grandgousier, Gargantua, Panurge, Pantagruel, and more. They all make their appearance, to make us laugh and reflect. The tour allows us to (re) discover a hilarious imaginary language featuring spoonerisms, verbal inventions, and expressions that have since passed into common parlance.

NEW AREAS

New areas have been added to the tour: the tenant farmer's house and the dovecote offer a complete reading of the biography of François Rabelais, as well as a presentation of the works of Gargantua, The Third Book and The Fourth Book.

THE HOME OF A MAJOR AUTHOR

Rabelais' two-storey house was built in the 15th century from tufa stone. The great hall, with its monumental fireplace, occupies the first floor, while the bedroom is up the stairs. The layout of the home has not changed since Rabelais' time.

GROUND FLOOR: THE GREAT HALL

This single room served as a kitchen and features a large fireplace and sink stone. In Rabelais' writing, this room became the space for the banquets of Grandgousier, the master of the house. Today, the room houses art collections (engravings, watercolours) and in particular a portrait of Rabelais by Henri Matisse which the artist offered to the museum when it first opened to the public in 1951.

UPSTAIRS: BEDROOMS

The first floor can be accessed by an outdoor staircase under an awning and gutter that extend from the roof (two very steep slopes covered in slate). Here, there are two rooms of unequal size. Climbing the stairs, one's eyes are drawn to **the landscape** of the novel.

As visitors cross the threshold, they are greeted by a large room with a fireplace. This was François Rabelais' place of birth.

AN EXCEPTIONAL DOVECOTE

The pigeon house was built adjacent to the main residence in the 17th century. **The building has become emblematic of the site.** Together with its curved terracotta roof tiles (an architectural feature in this part of Touraine), it is the first thing visitors see when they arrive. The number of pigeonholes (288), each of which can accommodate a pair of pigeons, was a status symbol for the owner of the property, since the number of pigeons bred was directly linked to the surface area of one's land.

THE HOME HOUSE

Outside the wine cellars, the "winegrower's house" includes authentic features-- an oven, stone kitchen garden--which were used to cook soup.



CAVE CELLARS, VINEYARDS, AND WINE

Six hundred square meters of cave cellars and galleries have been rehabilitated and opened to the public. Outbuildings close off the courtyard, while the true belly of the farmhouse, the wine cellars, abuts the winemaker's house. The cellars form an extraordinary space, which is perfect for today's temporary exhibitions. For its part, the vineyard has regained its place on the estate, thanks to the acquisition of an adjoining plot of land that is now used for producing wine.

Formerly quarries used to build houses on the estate, these underground cavities have been converted into a cave farm, with troughs carved in the rock. The window, which can still be seen, between the Rabelais residence and the animal cellar shows the extent to which people and animals (sheep, goats) lived in close proximity. At the time, animals were cherished for the warmth they could provide.

These underground stables extend to the lower cellars where a bread oven and a fireplace are located. Finally, the large wine cellars preserve traces of four winepresses and "grape harvest castings", reflecting the house's dedication to producing wine until the late 19th century.







4,000 BOTTLES PER YEAR... CRÉMANT AND CHINON

Nearly 4,000 bottles are produced on the estate, which bears the name Clos de La Devinière. Barrel-aged cabernet (red) and chenin (white) are produced on the estate. And a rosé crémant was introduced, completing the offering, in 2014. The production became listed as an AOC chinon with the 2016 harvest. That was the year the chinon appellation area was extended to include the Clos de La Devinière and the house of Rabelais. This is a strong symbol of the unique relationship between this author and his native land!

Visitors can enjoy a panoramic view of quintessential places in the author's work from the vineyard.





THE VINEYARDS: A LINK BETWEEN THE HOUSE, THE WORK, AND THE LANDSCAPE

The vineyard appears in an old 1699 engraving surrounded by a wall, which is why "clos" has been included in the wine production name. In the novel *Gargantua*, this is where the fight between the shepherds of Grandgousier and the *fouaciers* (bakers) of Lerné have their fight. The refusal on the part of the *fouaciers* to sell *fouaces* – small loaves – would lead to the Picrocholine War.

In order to reconnect with the wine history of the house and the spirit of its illustrious author, a vineyard was planted in 2004. A true link between the house, the work, and the landscape that inspired the novel *Gargantua*, the vineyard is composed of three parcels: one dedicated to Chenin, another to Cabernet Franc, and finally a conservatory of old varieties and table grapes.

Surrounded by hedges, the vineyard forms an exquisite natural setting for this country home, providing additional outdoor experiences for visitors, including readings of the landscape from the perspective of Rabelais' adventurous giants.



IN THE FOOTSTEPS OF GARGANTUA

The writer places his house at the heart of the novel. The Château de Grandgousier, Gargantua's birthplace and the seat of Rabelais' dynasty of giants, is modelled after La Devinière. It is the epicenter of a fantastic epic and a central place for the Picrocholine war, which was inspired by the day's current events: the conflict between Francis I and Charles V. The book ends with the foundation of the abbey of Thélème and the words of its motto: "Do what thou wilt!"



IN THE FOOTSTEPS OF GARGANTUA

+ A Walk:

- Walking tour starting from the museum: allows you to discover the castles of Coudray-Montpensier, La Roche-Clermault, the village of Seuilly, and the abbey of Seuilly. A must-see: the country home in the former tithe barn.
- Hiking trails: "The World of Rabelais" (8 km) around La Devinière and "Picrocholines wars trail" (17 km/4.25 hours) covering Seuilly-Lerné, La Roche-Clermault, and Cinais.

• By bike:

- Cycling tour "In the footsteps of Rabelais" (No. 42), 28 km, departing from Chinon, to discover villages, the banks of the Vienne, and the Richelieu-Chinon greenway.

The Rabelais Museum has been awarded the "Accueil vélo" and "Loire à vélo" labels.





SOUND EXPERIENCE "A LISTENING LANDSCAPE" RABELAIS AND THE RENAISSANCE

A digital listening journey using innovative technology to introduce visitors to the spaces of Rabelais' world: from La Devinière to the Abbey of Seuilly located a few hundred meters

away. Sound stations are activated as visitors move through the experience thanks to a mobile application that can be downloaded free of charge.

Recordings enhance the atmosphere and include readings of *Gargantua* and texts by current writers in residence at La Devinière.

Walking visitors will enjoy a sensory and literary experience as they follow

the trail linking the two symbolic spaces. The trail is a true contemporary reading of the landscape, which is listed as a World Heritage cultural landscape Site by UNESCO.



DIGITAL TABLE "GEOGRAPHIES"

Installed in the Rabelais residence, this multimedia exhibit offers an interactive and interesting reading of the *Geographies* of Rabelais' and of Gargantua's worlds. A pair of entrance doors immerse visitors into the heart of the Picrocholine wars, beckoning them to follow the path of Rabelais, a great Renaissance traveller.

GARGANTUA, QUE GRAND TU AS! NEW

The giant is a common figure in the collective imagination, and Rabelais is now part of the legend.


